Children identified as under achieving following half termly assessments have been targeted for small group intervention. Selected children across the school have been learning in small groups/1 to 1. Groups have had access to support which facilitate progress. 40+ children have benefited during the year from this intervention. 24+ of those children were in receipt of pupil premium funding. All children made significant progress in areas of phonics (KS1), writing and Maths identified.</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Success: 84% Year 1 pupils passed phonics All Year 2 pupils passed the retake Pupil progress across Key Stage 1 improving Pupil progress in Key Stage 2 at least in line/above National</p> <p>Parent Support Advisor: Supports children. Improve attendance, reduce anxiety and behavioural issues, support for parents. Attendance is improving and stands at 95.2%. There have been no permanent exclusions at Newham Bridge. Further evidence of case studies showing the support offered to individuals and families is available from the school.</p> <p>Educational Visits/Visitors. All Children. In September 2014 we introduced our Cornerstones Curriculum at Newham Bridge which is based around first-hand experience as a stimulus where ever possible. To enable all of our children to join in real experiences we have set aside funding per pupil to subsidise visits and visitors. The direct effect on children's academic progress has been measureable, not only in terms of improved standards but also in terms of the effect on children's PSHE and the SMSC aspects of the curriculum.</p> <p>ENGLISH : EAL pupils 7 pupils have received bespoke support from the EAL team who are supporting our pupils on a weekly basis.</p>
